**1.**

**To register, you must be:**

- A Canadian citizen
- Between 14 and 17 years old
- Living in Canada



**2.**

**If you qualify:**

Register online: it's easy and secure.



**3.**

**At 18** (happy birthday!), you'll be registered to vote in the next federal election.

## What you'll need to register

A copy of ID that proves your identity and address. You have **two easy options**:

### OPTION 1



Upload one piece of ID with your photo, name and current address.

**Examples:**

- Driver's licence
- Any government-issued card (federal, provincial or local)

### OPTION 2



Upload two pieces of ID. Both must show your name and at least one must show your address.

**Examples:**

- Health card + bank statement
- Student ID card + subscription bill

## Register of Future Electors ... *in a nutshell*

### What is the Register of Future Electors?

---

It's a list of 14-to-17-year-old Canadian citizens who signed up as future electors. On turning 18, they'll be added to the National Register of Electors and be ready to vote in federal elections or referendums.

### Who can register as future electors?

---

Canadian citizens between 14 and 17 years old can register as future electors.

### Why should I register to vote now?

---

It makes it easier for you to vote as soon as you're able to. Once a federal election is called, you'll get a voter information card telling you when and where to vote.

### How do I register as a future elector?

---

You can apply online at [elections.ca/future-electors](https://elections.ca/future-electors). All you need is accepted ID.

**Remember:** Registration is voluntary.

### Can my parent or guardian register me, or do I need their consent to register?

---

No. You must register yourself, but you don't need your parent's or guardian's consent. You can ask them for help with the application if you want.

### What does Elections Canada do with my information?

---

Your future elector information is protected by law. Elections Canada keeps it secure and only uses it for authorized purposes.

It can only be shared with provincial and territorial election agencies that are legally allowed to access it. By law, your information can't be shared with political parties, members of Parliament or candidates.
